FSA DATES, DEADLINES, & MESSAGES

In October, FSA processed 2023 ARC-County program payments. The payment rates for our area are Benton County, Non-irrigated corn, paid \$60.17/acre, and Mille Lacs County, Wheat, paid \$21.79/acre. Payments were also earned in Morrison and Sherburne Counties for some crops. The Price Loss Coverage (PLC) program for 2023 did not generate payments as the actual marketing price for 2023 was over the established reference price for all base crops in our county.

In early November, the County Committee election cycle will begin for FSA. Eligible voters will be mailed ballots that must be returned by December 2, 2024. In our counties, we have two elections taking place. LAA I consists of Mille Lacs County townships Page, Hayland, and all townships north of them. There is one candidate for election, Dustin Hoeck. LAA 4 consists of Benton County townships St. George and Glendorado and Mille Lacs County townships Milo and Greenbush. There are two candidates for election, Amber Britz and Michael Traut. If you are in these areas, please take the time to vote for your local representative on the FSA County Committee.

November is when a lot of cows find themselves grazing stockpiled pastures or crop residue. Especially with the fall weather, grazing is still very much going on. However, in both of those cases, additional protein should be added to the diet to help further digest the forages. Offering a protein tub while either grazing stockpiled pastures or corn stocks will help tremendously to utilize the most out of those forages. This is also the cheapest time of the year to build back body condition scores because we are not fighting the cold and snow. I will gladly come out to body condition score your cow herd and help you make a plan to get them back in shape. The goal is to have the herd at a minimum of 5. Whether you are weaning and backgrounding your calves or feeding cows, reach out to have a diet put together to help you feed them the cheapest so you can take full advantage of the record prices we are experiencing.

On the dairy side, winter prep can be a make or break time period for raising calves. Healthy calves should thrive no matter what the weather. We have a new hire. Ben, that is specializing in dairies and specifically calves. He would love to help you weigh your calves to benchmark them against industry standards and help you make a plan to strategize to reach your goals. Calf Starter should be offered right away as intakes can start at just a couple of days old. When feeding the Amplifier Max milk replacer, there is a palatant (a flavor enhancer that improves the taste, smell, texture, or appearance of food to make it more appealing) that is the same as in the Ampli-Calf Starter, this helps drive the starter intake sooner. Ben can help talk through different options to best fit your operation's goals. Also, it never is too late to do a bedding check in your huts. If you kneel down and your knee is wet, they need to have more clean dry bedding added. Also, the bedding should be deep enough that they can nestle into it. And please don't forget your calf jackets. You can reach Ben at 320-248-0436. Good luck with deer hunting!
